
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



Waiting For Sunrise by William Boyd 2013



The novel opens in 1913 Vienna where Lysander Rief, a young London actor is seeking a cure for a sexual dysfunction via a disciple of Freud's, a Dr Bennison. We are then treated to a beautifully drawn picture of Vienna on the eve of the First World War, with its grand buildings, famous art galleries and proud military traditions. Lysander lives in a boarding house with many colourful residents. His visits to Dr Bennison also mean he meets other English patients, all of whom appear in unexpected ways later in the novel.

Throughout the book Rief comes into contact with several beautiful women, all of whom are keen to jump into bed with him on very slight acquaintance.

His odd relationship with his mother is given considerable space. The reason for this becomes clear near the very end of the novel, when her part in the central mystery is revealed. His relationship with his uncle too has prominence, and this similarly is vital in the concluding pages.

As the core of the novel evolves, we become aware that the characters introduced in the early sections are all part of the plot to induce him to work as a spy for London Spymasters during the war. The core of the role is flushing out the Mole in the London network who is supplying information to the Germans about ordinance, and movement of men and goods in France. He is induced to undertake this role by an elaborate plot via a contrived arrest and a costly stay in premises supplied by the British Embassy.

The remainder of the novel is strictly an adventure story complete with a daring escape, a jaunt across no-mans-land via British trenches, and visits to a range of South coast hotels in pursuit of the Mole's assignations.

Boyd is of course a master storyteller, and this novel too is expertly structured with the central mystery spun out until the last page. The prose is wonderful and is particularly brilliant in his creation of Rief's Vienna. The whole is in the first person which I think works here. A jolly good yarn.

<u>Míncepíes for Chrístmas</u>

The dahlias are still blooming as I write and the leaves are only just beginning to turn but, by the time you read this, autumn will be well ensconced

and thoughts turning to Christmas. So... get ahead and make some mince pies. They will keep for several weeks in an airtight tin and it's worth making a couple of dozen to be able to offer to visitors as the season approaches.

The following recipe is the easiest one ever and gives great results, even for beginner pastry makers. I reckon that, because you add the flour last, it does not get tough like a rubbed-in pastry can. Try it and see! My mother, Joan, cut the recipe out of the Leicester Mercury in about 1959 and we made thousands over the decades, most of them to raise money in support of LOROS. In her 80s, she would make large batches of pastry and then make 100 dozen mince pies (yes, you read that right!) to take to Wreake Valley College's Christmas Fair. We always sold out...

Kaye Almey's Sweet Mince pie Pastry (Leicester Mercury, about 1959!)

280g softened butter (or margarine 72% fat)85g sugar1 egg225g plain flour225g SR flour

Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat in egg. Then gradually beat in flours until a soft dough forms. Knead well, then refrigerate before use (bring back to room temp for a couple of hours before rolling out). You can keep rolling, cutting, rolling and cutting until there is nothing left!

This makes great mince pies – I have a domestic gas oven and bake mince pies at Gas $4 - 4 \frac{1}{2}$ below middle shelf, about 22mins. 180-190C or reduce for a fan oven.

Reduce the butter content slightly (to about 500g) for a firmer dough that is suitable for pies and tarts. You may also want to experiment with changing the balance of the flours: more plain/less SR.

NOVEMBER

So, we are coming to the end of our gardening year, the weather has changed with more frosts and hardening earth so almost time to say "goodnight" to the garden until January 2022.

Jobs I shall be doing this month are :-

Leaves, leaves, leaves, clear them up especially from paths, decking and patio areas to keep them from making a slippery surface.

If you have finished with your mower give it a really good clean and remove any debris from the mower bed as well as the grass box so it doesn't rot over winter.

Clean and sharpen any tools you have finished with ready to store in your shed it is a good idea the spray oil onto anything metal, spade blades, hoe blades ect as it keeps the damp off them over winter and they will be ready for use next year.

November is the month to plant Tulips; I would suggest if your garden is very open or in a windy spot you grow a short stemmed variety so they don't get blown over which would be such a shame.

Prune your apple and pear trees remove any dead, damaged or crossing branches and reduce this year's growth and check that the shape is pleasing by standing back and looking at it from all sides.

The winter salad, carrots and pea shoots I am growing in the greenhouse are growing well and as the weather gets colder I shall cover them with fleece at dusk and remove it in the morning, fingers crossed they keep up their good growth and we have fresh salad for Christmas.

DECEMBER

There really isn't too much to do this month, well not for me.

If you didn't get time to prune your apple and pear trees you can do them this month.

Tidying the shed is a great job to do not only do you stay out of the wind and the worst of the cold weather, but you find things you have been looking for and when it's all done there is a sense of satisfaction.

If you have grown some sprouts then they should be ready to pick, start with the ones at the bottom of the stalk as they are the biggest, by picking them it gives the smaller top sprouts more energy and room to grow bigger. Brussels must mean it is Christmas.

If you are feeling artistic make yourself a door wreath to complete the Christmas look to your home.

Astronomical autumn

Usually, when we talk about the first day of autumn we are referring to the astronomical autumn which is defined by the Earth's axis and orbit around the Sun.

This year autumn begins on 22 September 2021 and ends on 21 December 2021.

The astronomical calendar determines the seasons due to the 23.5 degrees of tilt of the Earth's rotational axis in relation to its orbit around the Sun. Both <u>equinoxes</u> and solstices are related to the Earth's orbit around the Sun.

The Leicestershire 'Ride & Stride' is such a fixture in the calendar now, and a primarily open-air activity, that it was one of the few annual events that was able to take place last year, despite the pandemic. So, no surprise to see it happening again in 2021, on 11th September. It is run by the Leicestershire Historic Churches Trust to raise money for this very helpful and valuable organisation – and to give people the opportunity

to visit a number of churches that they may not normally see.

Most of the churches and other places of worship in the County are open for the event. Participants choose their own route, cycling or walking round as many of them as they can to raise sponsorship money. Half the sum raised goes to the church of their choice and half to the Trust. And several of our churches in the Upper Wreake have benefited from the Trust's funding towards repairs.

John Coleman has been a regular participant for a number of years and turned out again on behalf of All Saints, Hoby. He visited 16 churches, covering 27 miles and raising £260 in sponsorship. Maureen, sadly, finds even walking difficult these days, but being on duty in the church is also recognised for sponsorship, and she raised a further £60 for this. The Church is grateful to them, and to all other participants and especially to all their generous sponsors.

Hoby and District Local History Society Events - 2021

"Using aerial LiDAR data to illuminate past landscapes" by Matthew Beamish Hoby & District Village Hall, Wednesday 17th November at7.30pm



In this talk Matthew Beamish will explain how aerial LiDAR data can be used to illuminate past landscapes. Details of surface topography can be found where they cannot be seen with the naked eye, and in areas of woodland where traditional survey is not practical. The techniques of LIDAR processing and analysis will be illustrated with examples of different types of site from various periods.

Matthew Beamish is a graduate of Cambridge University and has been working as an archaeologist in Leicestershire since 1990. His archaeological expertise covers all prehistoric sites, including wetland preservation and wood technology. A particular highlight in recent years has been the analysis and experimental reconstruction of the first ever bark shield to have been found in the northern hemisphere. Technical expertise includes the development and implementation of database systems, site survey, the use of GIS systems, and the use of aerial LIDAR data. Matthew is the Membership Secretary for the Leicestershire Archaeological and Historical Society.

We planted these trees nearly 10 years ago and most of the taller ones are Frasers which are the no needle drop. They take longer to grow, and many are

now a large size as many events and markets were cancelled last year due to

Covid, but the trees keep on growing. The smaller trees are the traditional

Norway Spruce. These have been spruced up for this Christmas with a trim making them into the perfect Christmas tree shape.

It has become a tradition for many families locally to come and select the tree of their choice. This decision can take a long time and often nearly results in the first argument of Christmas.

When these trees go, the plot will be depleted of nutrients and with our light sandy soil will be ideal for growing wildflowers. We will also be planting more trees on the farm in our agroforestry scheme.

If people would like to bring their tree back to Lodge Farm it will be turned into woodchip to provide a mulch for this project. This will all help our carbon footprint.
